Holocaust Museum Houston's 2012 Max M. Kaplan Summer Institute for Educators is a four-day program exploring various dimensions of the Holocaust.

The Institute moves beyond the general history of the Holocaust to explore the implications of the Holocaust and other genocides. The Institute provides substantive content and the opportunity to network with internationally-known scholars of the Holocaust and teachers from around the world. Working in the Museum's exhibit space and classroom, teachers grow in their understanding of the Holocaust and refine their skills to teach about the history and lessons of the Holocaust.

The program is directed towards educators on a secondary or higher level, but we invite university students and educators of all levels who have a specific interest in, and background knowledge of, the Holocaust to attend. Seating is limited and is on a competitive basis. The cost to attend the program is \$150.00, which includes lunch and materials for the four days. Applications for the 2012 Summer Institute for Educators must be received with payment by June 18, 2012.

The program will be held in the Avrohm I. Wiesenberg Classroom and in the Museum's galleries, Morgan Family Center, Holocaust Museum Houston.
